

### IF WE MAKE IT FUN, THEY WILL COME!

The business meeting is a necessary part of any club's monthly meeting. It also can be very boring, especially to any perspective members that attend.

What can we do to "spice up" our monthly meeting and revitalize our club? I've heard many times over the years:

"But who are we going to get to do it?"
"That will never work."
"It takes too much time".
"Other clubs have many more members."
"We've always done it this way."



Here's a thought: How about if we change our thinking? Maybe we try coming up with new ways to make the club more interesting and attractive?

While at the recent Dayton Hamvention there were many forums that were available to attendees. Out of the many I attended; I chose 2 that were on improving your local ham radio club:

- ☐ HOW TO GROW AN AMATEUR RADIO CLUB FROM NEARLY DEAD TO AMAZING! by Brian Perry KY4BDP (Lake Cumberland Amateur Radio Association LCARA). We learned:
  - 10 steps any club can implement to grow their membership and get their members active and involved in club events.
  - Consistently hold activities such as workdays, skills training, field days and social gatherings (don't forget to have lots of great food!). A club this is active together grows together!
- ☐ TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL RADIO CLUBS by Mike Walters W8ZY (ARRL Field Services Manager). We learned:
  - ARRL Affiliated Clubs are the lifeblood of amateur radio at the local level. This forum will include a
    discussion of ideas and opportunities for radio clubs that are seeking growth and greater member
    participation. Topics include recruitment, licensing, training, engagement and leadership development.

What were, in my opinion, the best things I learned from these forums?

- 1. If we make it fun, people will come, as word spreads.
- 2. Learn from what other successful clubs are doing. I belong to 4 ham radio clubs, the RRRC, the Fond du Lac ARC, the Fox Cities ARC and the Superstition ARC (in Arizona). I follow what these clubs are doing for ideas.
- 3. Have a program at each monthly meeting to keep people interested and engaged.
- 4. Ask for specific help. "Hey Bill, can you help with XYZ on July XX at 3 PM?". Make the request by a personal phone call.
- 5. Encourage folks that have never been Net Control to give it a try. What better way to learn operating skills? Don't just ask for volunteers. Make a personal phone call and ask.
- Personal "touches" keep folks involved. Examples include reminder emails of club nets and activities, social media and a monthly newsletter with articles at all levels and lots of photos.
- 7. Have food! People love to eat. At the last RRRC meeting I volunteered to bring brats (15), buns (15), chips (3 bags) and soda (12). It didn't cost me much and folks enjoyed it! Would you be willing to volunteer to take a turn bringing food for one of our upcoming meetings?
- 8. Hold a "Mobile Drive In" where we meet at a local park or drive in restaurant to show others how we have rigs and antennas installed in our vehicles. Answer questions on how others can do safe and creative installs.
- 9. You must spend money to increase membership and keep people engaged. Pick a project people of all ages and ham radio knowledge can be involved in.

- Have a Member Shack Tour. This could be fun for both newer hams and old timers. I went to one of these events with the Fond du Lac ARC at Dave McCumber's (N9WO) OTH.
- 11. Add club activities to a club calendar available on our website, with things such as monthly meetings, workdays, nets, special projects and special event stations.
- 12. Meet current, and certainly new members, WHERE THEY ARE IN HAM RADIO. Help build their confidence and encourage participation in club activates. Have training sessions on how to program radios, how to participate in a net etc. Put together a new HAM packet you can give out when someone passes their first test. Have a kit for new hams to borrow & have a training session, have a 10m net for technicians.

The ARRL forum shared a Radio Club Health Check while I was at one of the forums mentioned above. Check it out -------

The LCARA forum leaders said "How to grow your amateur radio club? It requires leadership of 2 or more people that want to pursue these opportunities to grow. Without leadership, it will not grow."



### What is ARRL Field Day? You're Invited!

Field Day is a radio communications event that brings together amateur radio operators (also called "hams") within your community. The event is part picnic, campout, practice for emergencies, informal contest, and most of all, fun! ARRL Field Day is the most popular ham radio activity held annually in the US and Canada. On the fourth weekend in June each year, more than 35,000 radio amateurs get together with their clubs, groups, or friends to operate from remote locations.

It is a time when many aspects of amateur radio come together to highlight its many roles. While some will treat it as a contest, other groups use the opportunity to practice their emergency response capabilities. It is an excellent opportunity to demonstrate radio communications to the general public and organizations that amateur radio might serve in an emergency. For many radio clubs, ARRL Field Day is one of the highlights on their annual calendar.

The contest part involves contacting as many other stations as possible while learning to operate radio gear in abnormal situations and less than optimal conditions.

These same skills are utilized to help with large, preplanned, non-emergency events such as marathons and bike-a-thons; fundraisers such as walk-a-thons; celebrations such as parades, and exhibits at fairs, malls, and museums.

Despite the development of very complex, modern communications systems — or maybe because they *are* so complex — ham radio has been called into action, again and again, to provide communications in crises when it really matters. Hams are well-known for their communications support in real disaster and post-disaster situations.

### What is ARRL?

With more than 150,000 members, ARRL is The National Association for Amateur Radio in the US. ARRL is the primary source of information and support for radio amateurs. ARRL provides books, news, information for individuals and clubs, special events, continuing education classes, and other benefits to its members.

### What is Amateur Radio?

Often called "ham radio," the Amateur Radio Service is a worldwide community of licensed operators using the airwaves with every conceivable means of communications technology. It is made up of people who enjoy learning and being able to transmit voice, data, and pictures through the airwaves to places near and far without depending on commercial systems. The amateur radio frequencies are the last remaining place in the usable radio spectrum where an individual can develop and experiment with wireless communications. Not only can hams build and modify their equipment, but they can also create new ways to communicate via the airwaves - and do it as a globally connected community. Many people in the hobby form lifelong friendships with people they wouldn't have otherwise met. Many rock stars, Hollywood actors, and heads of state (and even your neighbor down the street) are ham radio operators. You can be, too! Get started at Field Day!

# Severe Thunderstorm Watch:

Severe thunderstorms are possible in and near the watch area. Stay informed and be ready to act if a severe thunderstorm warning is issued. Watches are issued by the Storm Prediction Center (www.spc.noaa.gov) for counties where severe thunderstorms may occur. The watch area is typically large, covering numerous counties or even states.

# Severe Thunderstorm Warning:

A severe thunderstorm has been indicated by radar or reported by a spotter producing hail one inch or larger in diameter and/or winds exceeding 58 mph. Warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property. Take shelter in a substantial building. Get out of mobile homes that could be blown over by high winds. Severe thunderstorms can produce tornadoes with little or no advance warning.

# **BEFORE** A THUNDERSTORM

- Be Weather Ready: Check the forecast often to find out what you can do before severe weather strikes. Preparation is key to staying safe and minimizing impacts.
- Be Weather-Ready: Check the forecast regularly to see if you're at risk for severe thunderstorm. Listen to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio to stay informed about watches and warnings.
- Sign Up for Notifications: Know how your community sends warnings. Check media severe thunderstorm alerts available in your area.
- family plan that includes an emergency meeting place. Pick a safe room in your home such as a basement, storm cellar or an interior room on the lowest floor with no windows. Get more details at <a href="https://www.ready.gov/make-a-plan">https://www.ready.gov/make-a-plan</a>
- Practice Your Plan: Conduct a family severe thunderstorm drill regularly so everyone knows what to do if a damaging wind or large hail is approaching. Don't forget pets.
- Prepare Your Home: Keep trees trimmed near your house. If you have time before severe weather hits, put away loose objects, close windows and doors, and move valuable objects inside or under a sturdy structure.
- Help Your Neighbor: Take CPR training so you can help if someone is hurt during severe weather. Conduct a drill with elderly or disabled neighbors.

# **DURING** A THUNDERSTORM

- Stay Weather Ready: Continue to listen to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio to stay updated about watches and warnings.
- At Your House: Go to your secure location if you hear a severe thunderstorm warning and damaging wind or large hail is approaching. Take your pets if time allows.
- At Your Workplace or School: Stay away from windows if you are in a severe thunderstorm warning.
   Damaging wind or large hail could blow heavy object at windows. Do not go to large open rooms such as cafeterias, gymnasiums or auditoriums.
- Outside: Go inside a sturdy building immediately if severe thunderstorms are approaching. Sheds and storage facilities are not safe. Taking she Iter under a tree can be deadly. The tree may fall on you and you are at risk of getting struck by lightning.
- In a vehicle: Being in a vehicle is safer than being outside; however, if you have time, drive to closest secure shelter.

# **AFTER ATHUNDERSTORM**

- Stay Informed: Keep your NOAA Weather Radio or portable radio with you in your safe place/ shelter, so you can listen for updates on tornado watches and warning and know whether the threat has passed.
- Contact Your Family and Loved Ones:

Let your family and close friends know that you're okay so they can help spread the word. Power may be out and phone lines may be down.

- Assess the Damage: After you are sure the severe weather threat has ended, check your property for damage. When walking through storm damage, wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt and sturdy shoes. Contact local authorities if you see power lines down. Stay out of damaged buildings. Be aware of insurance scammers if your property has been damaged.
- Help Your Neighbor: If you see someone injured, call 911 then, if you are trained, provide first aid until emergency responders arrive.

### HOLY SMOKES IS IT HOT IN ARIZONA!

As most of you know, I spend time in Arizona activating Summits On The Air (SOTA) peaks year round. It is very normal for it to be scorching hot during the summer months. Of course, that doesn't stop me from hiking / climbing SOTA summits, but I must carry much more water and be extremely careful. Today, Saturday June 15<sup>th</sup> was my first full day here. Excessive heat warnings are almost every day, and I take those warnings seriously. My options are 1. To get up early (I am a night owl) or 2. Get to altitude where it is cooler.

This morning, I decided to "man up" and get up early. I thought (wisely) that a SOTA 2-pointer would be a good choice to re-acclimate my body to the heat. The SOTA organization realizes that it takes extra effort in the heat of summer (and in the cold of winter in WI). That means from June 1<sup>st</sup> to September 1<sup>st</sup> I get a 3-point summer bonus on most Arizona summits. A 2-pointer becomes a 5-pointer. Woohoo! It was in the low 100's when I finished the activation but rose to 108 F later in the afternoon. 12% humidity – a dry heat – yada yada – still smoking hot!!!!


Side note: the goal of many SOTA activators is to earn Mountain Goat status. That's 1,000 points. Summits range from 1 point to 10 points. The highest SOTA summit ever activated (a 10-pointer) was Aconcagua, in Argentina, at 22,841' ASL. It takes a lot of 2-point summits to get to 1,000! Although I have activated many 10-point summits, some 2-point summits are quite difficult. For example, Turks Cap, which is near our home, is a 5-mile hike (with 25-30 lbs. in my backpack), involves scrambling (crawling on all fours over boulders) and climbing. It takes about 4+ hours to complete. I've activated it in 106 F and it was nasty!

In short, today's activation of Shaw Butte was a success. And since I was just north of Phoenix, after the activation I stopped at HRO (which is only 10 minutes from the summit). Pretty hard to make for a better day!

- ☐ LEARN HOW TO HELP WITH SEVERE WEATHER SPOTTING.
- □ JOIN IN ON FUN ACTIVITIES! Fox hunts (finding a hidden transmitter via direction finding equipment), operating portable "off grid", participating in worldwide contests, and "Field Day" (we're at Derge Park on Beaver Dam Lake) the third weekend in June and be part of antenna raising party!
- ☐ THIS IS NOT YOUR GRANDPA'S HAM RADIO HOBBY! Wow has this hobby evolved over the years. Ham radio is the original "social network"! We text via ham radio. We can bounce radio signals off the surface of the moon. We do Amateur TV via radio. We send email via ham radio. We do ham radio via satellites.
